In 2023, your donations helped us achieve some incredible feats.




AIS PREP helped me feel more ready to go to college and do well in my high school classes. I want to continue learning more about the different types of engineering.

AIS TRADE SCHOLARSHIP

Not all students are suited for traditional four-year college degrees, and trade schools provide alternative pathways to gain valuable skills and embark on rewarding careers. Supporting trade school scholarships acknowledges the importance of diversifying education options and recognizing the value of vocational training. It helps bridge the gap between education and employment, empowers individuals with valuable skills, and strengthens communities and industries alike. Since its inception, in May 2021, the AlS Trade Scholarship Program has helped 22 Native American students receive a Trade School education.





I am a senior at Central Washington University, and I am currently pursuing my BS in Ecology and Evolutionary Biology. In 2019, I moved from Pocatello, ID to Yakima, WA after I was offered a softball scholarship at YVC. I graduated with my Associates Degree of Arts, and I am proud to have accomplished this while being a student athlete. One challenge I have faced is being so far away from my family. Being away from them has given me the drive to finish my degree so I can return home. Another challenge is keeping up my GPA. College can be very difficult, and I have focused on getting good grades and excelling in my course of study.

After graduating with my bachelor's, I plan to return home and work at my local tribal fisheries department. I want to have a positive impact on the fisheries program here on my reservation. The fish migration that goes by my reservation has been on a slow decline within the past decade. With my knowledge and experience I plan to work hard to improve the fish migration. In the next decade, my goal is to raise climate change awareness to people and do everything I can to increase the fish run.

With climate change affecting salmon runs, I hope to bring awareness and change that will help address future salmon runs. I want my children's children to still be able to do traditional salmon fishing in the future.

I was excited to learn of my selection for this scholarship and I am deeply appreciative of your support. The AlS Award will pay for my tuition expenses, which will alleviate my financial burden, and allow me to focus on my studies. I was the only student from my High School graduating class to apply and get accepted to the University of Oklahoma. Despite the financial burden, my family wanted me to have a chance to fulfill my dream, so I packed my bags and traveled to Norman, Ok to begin my freshman year of college.

I didn't know a soul and had to begin the process of building relationships and making new friendships. My freshman year was a difficult journey that was lonely at times and challenging. My goal is to pursue a Masters degree in Accounting and become a CPA.

I am a Biology major. So far, it is very challenging. However, I really enjoy my science classes. I am taking Biology II, Chemistry II, and Genetics this semester. So, I am very busy, but I love it. Medical care is very important, and there is a severe lack of access to these services in many Native communities. 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
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
